South Tawakoni Water Supply Corporation receives Community Assistance Grant

(Wills Point, TX) The Sabine River Authority of Texas (SRA) is pleased to award South Tawakoni Water Supply Corporation (WSC) a Community Assistance Grant as part of their FY-2006 Economic Development Initiative. The \$10,000 check will be used to leverage local funds to improve their water system infrastructure. "South Tawakoni WSC is working hard to improve our water system to better accommodate families in the South Tawakoni area," stated WSC General Manager Richard Phillips. "We appreciate SRA's assistance in partnering with us for this project," added Phillips. The grant received from SRA will be used to build a backup chlorination system for the water system. "SRA is proud to partner with South Tawakoni WSC in their efforts to improve the quality of services provided to its customers," stated SRA General Manager Jerry Clark.

Funds provided for the Community Assistance Grant Program must fall within four project categories, which include 1) Water Supply; 2) Wastewater Management;

3) Water Conservation; and 4) Water Quality and are limited to \$10,000 per project. Funds for the grant for South Tawakoni WSC were approved by SRA's Board of Directors in December of 2005.

In order to be eligible for the Community Assistance Program, applicants should be a governmental entity (City, County, SUD, MUD or COG) or a non-profit, member-owned Water Supply Corporation and located within the Sabine River Basin of Texas. Water resource projects should be consistent with the statutory mission of SRA-Texas. Created as a conservation and reclamation district in 1949, responsibilities of the Sabine River Authority of Texas are to control, store, preserve and distribute the waters of the Sabine River and its tributary system for useful purposes.

The Sabine River Basin covers a large portion of East Texas with a population of approximately 600,000 in all or part of 21 counties according to U.S. 2000 Census figures. A large portion of that area is rural in nature. "The Sabine River Authority of Texas is providing this grant opportunity to promote the improvement of the quality and quantity of services essential for the development and growth of viable communities within the Sabine River Basin," said SRA General Manager Jerry Clark. "SRA is committed to work in tandem with existing counties, communities and water districts throughout the basin to promote the economic vitality of the region."
